November's book selection is *The Glass Castle* by Jeannette Walls. This award-winning book is a remarkable memoir of resilience and redemption, and a revelatory look into a family at once deeply dysfunctional and uniquely vibrant. When sober, Jeannette's brilliant and charismatic father captured his children's imagination, teaching them physics, geology, and how to embrace life fearlessly. But when he drank, he was dishonest and destructive. Her mother was a free spirit who abhorred the idea of domesticity and didn't want the responsibility of raising a family.

The Walls children learned to take care of themselves. They fed, clothed, and protected one another, and eventually found their way to New York. Their parents followed them, choosing to be homeless even as their children prospered.

The Glass Castle is truly astonishing – a memoir permeated by the intense love of a peculiar, but loyal, family. Jeannette Walls has a story to tell, and tells it brilliantly, without an ounce of self-pity.

Jeannette Walls lives in Virginia and is married to writer John Taylor. She is a regular contributor to MSNBC.

Foreign and Independent Film Series

The Great Falls Public Library's Foreign and Independent Film Series continues its seventh season on Wednesday, November 7, at 7:00 pm. and Saturday, November 10, at 2:00 pm. This series is free and open to the public.

November's selection is the award-winning film, *The Screaming Man*. It tells the story of former swimming champ Adam, who is a pool attendant at a hotel in Chad, Africa. He loses his job to his son, leaving him resentful and humiliated. The country is also in the throes of a civil war that authorities demand people contribute to. Penniless Adam is constantly harassed for his lack of contribution. In a moment of weakness, Adam makes a decision he will forever regret.

This film won awards at the Cannes Film Festival and the Chicago International Film Festival.

The featured short is *Expectations*.

Films will be shown each month on the first Wednesday and the following Saturday. The series, which runs September through May, is free and open to the public. Be forewarned, some films may contain strong language or adult situations. They are not rated by MPAA but in our brochures we have tried to indicate content. Brochures are available at the library.
