Art @ the Library

In February the Great Falls Public Library will host The Wild and Woolly West, an exhibit by the Arts Association of Montana. A diverse array of works will be featured, including paintings, pottery and more. Also, the exhibit will feature works from the Global Art Project. This is a global art exchange for peace around the world. A unique facet of the Global Art Project featured in this exhibit will be the Hands Project. This is a project where participants

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trace their hands and decorate the tracings. These are then used to create a unique piece of art. The pieces in this project will be used to create a mobile, which will be hung at the library for the month. After this exhibit, the piece will be submitted to the Global Art Project for exhibition. A reception for the artists will be held on Thursday, February 20, from 5 – 7 pm. This reception is free and open to the public.

I Love to Read Month

The Great Falls Public Library is celebrating I Love to Read Month throughout February in the Kids' Place. Family Reading Activity charts will be available at the library at the end of January. These charts have 28 suggested activities families can do as a group for the month. Participants can use the suggested activities or substitute their own. Montana Territory and the Civil War

The Great Falls Public Library is hosting a book reading/talk by Ken Robison on Saturday, February 1, 2:00 pm. when he will read from and discuss his latest book, *Montana Territory and the Civil War*.

By 1864, the Federal government had carved the Montana Territory out of the existing Idaho and Dakota Territories. Gold from Montana Territory fueled the Union war effort, yet loyalties were mixed among the miners. In this compelling collection of stories, Ken Robison illustrates how Southern sympathizers and Union loyalists, deserters and veterans, freed slaves and former slaveholders living side by side made a volatile and vibrant mix that molded Montana. Discover how fiery personalities fought to keep order in the newly formed frontier, while brave Confederate and Union veterans and their hardy families created an enduring legacy that helped shape modern Montana.

Ken Robison is an author and historian who lives in Great Falls, Montana. A native Montanan, he is historian at the Overholser Historical Research Center in Fort Benton. Ken serves as historian for the Great Falls/Cascade County Historic Preservation Commission and is active in historic preservation throughout Montana. Ken writes monthly columns on Montana's Civil War veterans for two newspapers. His books include *Life and Death on the Upper Missouri: The Frontier Sketches of Johnny Healy*; *Cascade County and Great Falls*; and *Fort Benton*. He writes historical articles for *Montana the Magazine of Western History* and other regional journals. The Montana Historical Society honored Ken as "Montana Heritage Keeper" in 2010.

Foreign and Independent Film Series

The Great Falls Public Library's Foreign and Independent Film Series continues its seventh season on Wednesday, February 5 at 7:00 pm. and Saturday, February 8, at 2:00 pm. This series is free and open to the public.

February's selection is the Israeli film *Off White Lies*. This award-winning film tells the story of teenager Libby, who when sent to live with her father, Shaul, discovers he is a homeless scammer. The coincidence of her arrival with the 2nd Lebanon war allows Shaul to come up with a plan: they pose as refugees from the war torn North enabling them to be taken in by a family in Jerusalem. Here father and daughter try to rebuild their relationship. Will the impermanence of their false identities coupled with Libby's fury at all the lies in her life conspire to undo them or bring them closer? This film contains adult situations (AS).

The featured short is *Catherine the Great*.

Films will be shown each month on the first Wednesday and the following Saturday. The series, which runs September through May, is free and open to the public. Be forewarned, some films may contain strong language or adult situations. They are not rated by MPAA but in our brochures we have tried to indicate content. Brochures are available at the library.

OpenBooks Discussion

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The OpenBooks Discussion Series, which runs October – May, continues on Thursday, February 6, at 7:00 pm, in the Montana Room of the library. These discussions, sponsored by Humanities Montana and the Great Falls Public Library Foundation, are free and open to the public. You may attend any and all of the discussions. Books are available at the library three weeks prior to each meeting. You will need a library card to check a book out whether you attend the discussion or just read the book. Discussions are facilitated by Penny Hughes-Briant, a teacher at UGF. For more information on this series call 453-0349.

February's selection is *A Thousand Splendid Suns*, a novel by Khaled Hosseini. The story covers three decades of anti-Soviet jihad, civil war and Taliban tyranny in Afghanistan seen from the perspectives of two women. Mariam is the scorned illegitimate daughter of a wealthy businessman, forced at age fifteen into marrying Rasheed, who grows increasingly brutal when she fails to produce a child. Eighteen years later, Rasheed takes another wife, fourteen year-old Laila, a smart and spirited girl whose parents are killed by rocket fire. Mariam and Laila become allies in a battle with Rasheed, whose violent abuse is endorsed by custom and law. The author gives a forceful portrait of despotism where women are dependent on fathers, husbands and especially sons, the bearing of male children being their only path to an accepted social status.

Hosseini was born in Kabul, Afghanistan, and moved to the U.S. in 1980. His first novel, *The Kite Runner*, is an international bestseller. This, his second novel, was published in 2007.

Cooking Matters

The Great Falls Public Library's five-part series on helpful strategies for healthy living and eating on a budget concludes on Thursday, February 6, 7:00 pm. Sandee Cardinel, a nutrition educator with MSU Extension and a personal chef and owner of Earth to Table Chef Services is presenting this program. These classes are free and open to the public. Sandee will end her series with a discussion on the importance of calcium and protein in the diet and how to get the needed amounts while staying within a budget.

Gadgets Galore

The Great Falls Public Library is hosting free drop-in sessions on Thursday, February 6 and February 20, from Noon to 1 pm. These sessions will offer training for using electronic gadgets to access and utilize various library materials, including MontanaLibrary2Go. From MontanaLibrary2Go, patrons may download audio and e-books for check-out. The sessions are not meant as general training or tech support for electronic gadgets, but rather as stated above geared towards using electronic gadgets in relation to various library resources.

Devices include, but are not limited to, e-readers, Smart phones, iPads, iPods, mp3 players and other comparable devices. If applicable, attendees are reminded to bring passwords and usernames. Page Forward

The new book discussion groups introduced by the Great Falls Public Library last month continue in February. Page Forward Saturdays continues on Saturday, February 8, 10 a.m., and continues on the second Saturday of each month. This discussion group is unique in as much as each month's discussion will be a celebration of the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in Montana and will focus on books written by and about Montana women.

February's selection is *Black Cherries* by Grace Stone Coates, originally published in 1931. In this series of linked stories the child narrator, Veve, cannot fathom all the mysteries of her family's life together, but by watching and listening she pieces together a painful past.

Grace Stone Coates (1881–1976) spent most of her life in the tiny ranching community of Martinsdale in southwestern Montana. During a seven-year period, twenty of Coates's short stories were cited in the annual Best American Short Stories as Distinctive or Honor Roll stories, and John Updike chose Coates's "Wild Plums" for inclusion in Best American Short Stories of the Century. Coates also published two collections of poetry.

Page Forward Wednesdays continues on Wednesday, February 12, 7:00 pm, and continues on the second Wednesday of each month. If you like to read and are interested in a fun, stimulating discussion group, check this

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out.

February's selection is *The Thirteenth Tale* by British author Diane Setterfield. Published in 2006, *The Thirteenth Tale* is a novel in the tradition of the Bronte sisters. The main character, Margaret Lea, is invited to write the life story of bestselling author, Vida Winter, who has spent her entire career making up her past. Margaret is hesitant, convinced that the master storyteller will lie to her just like she lied to all the others. However, lured by Miss Winter's Victorian style of writing, Margaret takes the contract and quickly realizes that by learning Miss Winter's secret she will be forced to confront a secret of her own. *The Thirteenth Tale* is a story that has all the elements of classic English literature and all the mystery of a modern day blockbuster.

Participation is free and open to the public. The group meets in the Small Meeting Room in the basement of the library. A limited number of books will be available for checkout at the front desk of the library three weeks prior to each discussion.

Black Heritage Evening: Celebrating Black American Culture, History & Cuisine

The Great Falls Public Library is hosting an annual event celebrating Black History Month and the Heritage of Great Falls' African American community on Thursday, February 13th, 6:00 pm. The program features African American culture, history, and cuisine. This program, which is free and open to the public, is co-sponsored by the Alma Smith Jacobs Foundation, a non-profit promoting education and historic preservation. The event honors the life of Great Falls Librarian and Community Leader Alma Smith Jacobs.

A variety of speakers and performers participating include Kathy Reed, Mayor Michael Winters, the Alexander Temple Choir and Hip Hop Dance, Inter-Faith Gospel Choir, Rev. Anna Clark, and a sampling of soul food.

Each month we will show three TED Talks videos featuring experts in their fields sharing cutting edge ideas, innovation, and progressive ways of applying expertise for the betterment of society. A lively discussion will follow.

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In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TEDx is a program of local, self-organized events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience. At a TEDx event, TEDTalks video and live speakers combine to spark deep discussion and connection in a small group. These local, self-organized events are branded TEDx, where x = an independently organized TED event. The TED Conference provides general guidance for the TEDx program, but individual TEDx events are self-organized. (These events are subject to certain rules and regulations developed by TED.)

TED is a nonprofit organization devoted to Ideas Worth Spreading. Started as a four-day conference in California almost 30 years ago, TED has grown to support those world-changing ideas with multiple initiatives.
